'Supporting good mental health in your schools'

The Schools Wellbeing Service continues to work with young people on their caseloads and accept new referrals from schools. PMHW's will maintain contact with schools, through triage or similar, which will enable cases to be discussed and referred to the PMHW attached to that school. We are also operating a **Consultation Line** where parents/carers and professionals can request advice and support.



We have been in touch with all Strategic Mental Health Leads within secondary school, and all primary, special and SEMH hub SENCO's in order to gather names of those pupils who are at high risk of self-harm or have presented at A&E, with the aim of reducing the risk of escalation. These are reviewed alongside school colleagues on a regular basis.

We are also working with others in order to develop resources that are being placed on BEEM and are sharing these resources with Strategic Mental Health Leads in secondary schools and SENCO's in primary schools, special schools and SEMH provisions. These are also circulated through AMAZE, PACC, T21 and FYP.

We are in the process of implementing e-wellbeing as part of our therapeutic work and have developed safe working practices to offer group work in addition to 1-1 work.

Linking in with a range of external services is enabling us to access a wider range of vulnerable families, and we are expecting this level of cross service working to further develop.

We are working with CAMHS and Community Wellbeing Service in order to see how we can best support each other, as members of teams are used elsewhere or go into isolation, in order to ensure provision for children and young people's mental health remains covered. The attached threshold document outlines how our services fit together.



Four member of the Schools Wellbeing Service are currently being prepared to support at A&E and others are supporting, in a voluntary capacity, in hospitals.

The MHST continues to develop and we are pleased to say that, over this period, will be able to take referrals from all secondary schools. Referrals will be made through the PMHW via school triage or similar.

Currently we are looking at virtual training around areas such as bereavement. This will be offered in smaller groups and further information will be forwarded to the Strategic Mental Health Leads and SENCO's.

Our colleagues within schools have been providing useful feedback from our mail outs, which has helped us to respond to key areas of need.
